# **Business Activity on the Rise** New Businesses Opening and Investing in Franklin Park

It is important to business that they have a business friendly Village to work with. It is our mission, as well as that of our Economic Development Commission and our Franklin Park Partnership, to welcome new firms but also to assist our existing businesses to grow and prosper in Franklin Park.

We have instituted an aggressive business call program, reaching out to our local businesses to uncover obstacles to their growth and success. We have also been working to improve our customer service and cut red tape at Village Hall including streamlining our permitting process and occupancy applications.

I am pleased to announce that these efforts have paid off. Franklin Park is experiencing increased investment in our community and an allimportant increase in jobs. New businesses are opening, and established businesses are coming out from the cloud of the recession, adding jobs and expanding their operations and markets.

In the last twelve months, we have processed over 50 new business applications. We are seeing a healthy mix of industrial users, service businesses and retail offerings. These new businesses will add over 500 jobs to our community. New employees mean new visitors to our Village, new customers at our retailers, and new patrons at our restaurants.

Avenue. They have invested over \$1.6 million and added over 50 new jobs. Another business that came to our community is ACE Rent-A-Car which added 40 new employees. ACE moved from Des Plaines and is working closely with the Village to add even more retail opportunities to the Village at their new location.

The Village has also witnessed major growth in the existing Franklin Park businesses such as Chicago Records Management. This company expanded their operations into the former Luxury Motors and made over \$200,000 in building improvements. The expansion of Chicago Records Management is creating over 100 construction jobs. Multi-Group Logistics is also expanding in our Village and has leased additional parking space to accommodate their expanded fleet. PNC Bank moved across the street and built a larger branch with a convenient drive-thru. The PNC Bank occupies the former Blockbuster building and the construction methods used led to it becoming one of the Village's first LEED Certified Buildings.

ComEd has submitted permit applications for \$800,000 improvement to its Transfer Station on Belmont, west of Mannheim.

We have welcomed many new businesses in the last year including Multi-Tech Cold Forming, Prairie State Impressions, Simms Recycling Solutions

and Ringspann Corporation. In addition, Northern Light Energy, Safe Traffic Systems, Mysterious and Reassuring, a retail consignment store and Merry Maids have all chosen to make Franklin Park their business address.

We are working to encourage and sustain our commercial enterprises as well. As a result of working with the owner of the former K-Mart site to improve the condition and appearance of the property, the Village has helped attract the national retailer Big Lots to that location. We are currently working with additional national retailers to fill retail vacancies. This activity represents a dynamic revitalization of retail for the Grand and Mannheim Shopping District.

We are also refocusing attention to the heart of the community, the downtown district along Franklin Street. The Community Development Department was awarded a grant for a consultant to analyze and rezone the downtown in order to revive redevelopment opportunities and to make it easier for businesses to set up shop in the downtown district. We are working with the downtown merchants to better promote this corridor and increase activity to the downtown.

The Village is excited to announce that a new specialty pub will be opening soon on the 9700 block of Franklin Avenue. In addition, there is a new owner and broker firm representing the retail space of Phase I of the Crossings.

We are pleased that the business community is recognizing our location and transportation advantages. Economic vitality leads to more jobs and stable home prices. Our staff and elected officials will continue to work closely with business owners to encourage expansion, investment and relocation to our Village.

This is just the beginning. We are proud of the progress we have been able to make despite the recession. We look forward to our economic development efforts paying dividends for our homeowners and residents.

### **Working to Create Train Quiet Zones**

As we discussed in October's newsletter, establishing a Quite Zone in Franklin Park is a top priority for the Board and myself. We all know how invasive and annoying train noise can be.

Municipalities can create a "Quiet Zone" from 10 PM to 6 AM that would allow for the trains to voluntarily dispense with the use of train horns. But train horns are blown as a safety measure. In order to get a Quiet Zone designation the Village must make substantial investments in alternative safety measures at each grade crossing in order to cease the incessant horn blowing.

The modifications could include such things as quad gates or changing the grade level of the crossing. Because Franklin Park has several train crossings, we have been told that to effectively eliminate the noise and meet the safety requirements - all crossings must be reconfigured. This effort may require the Village to expend up to \$3.5 million to bring the crossings into compliance with the FRA requirements for eligibility of a Quiet Zone.

We are working closely with officials from the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) to become one of the few communities in the nation with six sets of rails to be designated a Quiet Zone. We are also aggressively pursuing grants and revenue sources so that we can make the very costly required safety improvements in order to qualify for the Quiet Zone designation.

Leaf Pick-up and Street Sweeping Continues

Please place your leaves in brown biodegradable bags and remember to put them out on garbage day with your recycling for pick-up. Bags are available for purchase at local grocery and hardware stores. Leaves cannot be picked-up if they are placed in plastic bags or in the street. Pick-up continues until December 5. In addition, yard waste bags will only be picked up through December 5. These dates are established by Allied Waste. The Utility Department will sweep Village curbs from September 15 till December 1. Please check signs on your block for restrictions.



Having problems accessing senior services? A representative from West Suburban Senior Services will be available at Village Hall, on the fourth Wednesday of the month, from 9 AM to Noon to help. Assistance is available for a variety of programs including helping you complete Circuit Breaker applications, and to sign-up for Medicare and Medicaid. For details, call 708-547-5600.

Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program

A representative will be at Village Hall every Tuesday from 9 AM - Noon beginning on November 20th to process LIHEAP applications. Please bring the following documents with you: a Social Security / SSI (monthly) benefit letter for 2012, your pension letter for the last 30 days, a valid Photo ID, Social Security Cards for all members in the household, proof of income for the last 30 days for all house members 18 years or older, a current NICOR and ComEd bill (disconnect notices have to be included if you are applying) and bring your Medical Card.


### Rain Barrel Reminders

It's recommended to disconnect your rain barrels in the winter months because a constant freezing and thawing of the water inside may weaken cause cracks in the barrel. Store your barrels upside down in the winter to keep them clean for future use.

Vehicles being booted can have substantial violations and significant money owed to the Village. The Police Department will only immobilize a vehicle that has 10 or more outstanding parking tickets.

This vehicle has an outstanding amount of \$24,500 in fines.
