In order to meet the demands of the new rules coming from the IL Department of Natural Resources, to respond to the large water rate increases from the City of Chicago, and to continue to provide quality water to our residents, you will soon see a significant increase in your water bill on the order of 50%. We will do our best to minimize the impacts of these increases. We will keep you updated in the coming weeks and months.

Below are steps that you can take to conserve water:



- Water your lawn and garden in the morning or evening when temperatures are cooler to minimize evaporation and lessen the amount of water needed.
- Adjust sprinklers so only your lawn is watered and water is not wasted on your house, the sidewalks, or the street.
- Repair leaking faucets and toilets; this is the number one water waster in homes.
- Install a rain barrel to capture and re-use stormwater.
- Spread a layer of organic mulch around plants to retain moisture and save water, time and money.
- Check your shower to see if it fills a onegallon bucket in less than 20 seconds. If so, replace the showerhead with a waterefficient model. If you shorten your shower by a minute or two, you will save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time. Please go to our website to get information on how to compost.

Low Cost Rabies Vaccines and Microchip Clinics

Cook County's Animal and Rabies Control provides an affordable rabies vaccinations to help bring pet owners in compliance with the law while providing an essential public health protection for the public from a deadly disease. A clinic is scheduled for Tuesday, July 30 between 10 AM. and 2:45 PM in the Jewel Parking Lot at 10203 W. Grand Avenue. Rabies vaccines will cost \$7 for a one year and \$21 for a three year. Ferrets may only be vaccinated for one year and the cost of the vaccine is \$9. Pet owners can have their pets microchipped for \$10; however, this does not include the national registration fee. 


Street Dance & Car Show - July 26
