March Ballot Measure

Last month we discussed the critical condition of our streets and that many are in need of extensive and expensive repair. Your Village government asked residents to participate in a Citizen Advisory Committee on Infrastructure to determine the best funding mechanism to bring our streets up to acceptable condition. The Committee met several times and came to the consensus that the funding mechanism to repair and replace failing streets was a 1% increase in the sales tax that would be dedicated to street improvement and repairs. We asked our citizens to respond to a mail survey and a phone poll to gauge their interest in pursuing a ballot measure. We also discussed the issue on our recent telephone town hall meeting.

Based on those responses and the consensus of the Citizen Advisory Committee on Infrastructure, the Board has decided to place the question on the March ballot.

Below is the question approved by the Village Board of Trustees that will be placed on the March 18, 2014, Primary Election Ballot.

This is a primary election, but registered voters do not have to declare a party if they do not wish to do so. You may ask the Judges for a referendum only ballot. This is true of Early Voting and Mail-in Ballots as well.

Franklin Park is strengthened by its engaged, active and involved civic community. We encourage all registered voters to vote and make their opinion known on this important matter.

Shall the corporate authorities of the Village of Franklin Park, Illinois be authorized to levy a Non-Home Rule Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax and YES a Non-Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax (commonly referred to as a "sales tax"), each at a rate of 1%, pursuant to 65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.3 and 65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.4, for expenditures on the repair and reconstruction of public streets?

The Water and Streets Divisions make snow removal their primary focus during the winter months.

Franklin Park Focus: **Water and Streets Divisio**

It is a source of community pride that when it snows, Franklin Park's streets are often cleared much quicker than the streets of our neighboring communities.

Joe "Tiny" Lauro, the Village's Public Works Commissioner, is in charge of our Water and Streets Division and has the nickname Tiny but his job is not! "Tiny" and his dedicated staff at the Water and Streets Divisions are responsible for clearing over 76 miles of streets and roads and almost 19 miles of alleys. The Streets Division, part of the Department of Public Works, handles all public streets, right-ofway and landscaping responsibilities including street repairs, our forestry program, brush removal, street sweeping, alley maintenance and traffic and street sign replacement. But at this time of year, both Water and Streets Divisions make snow removal duties their primary focus.

They stay ahead of the game by being diligent about monitoring advancing systems. They consistently plan and execute coordinated snow removal strategies to ensure that our streets are passable, trash can be removed, businesses can operate and our children can travel safely to school.

During the historic snowstorm of February, 2011, over 20 inches of snow rapidly blanketed the region. Franklin Park's streets were so clean and clear that Franklin Park School District 84 was one of only three primary school districts in the entire Chicago metropolitan area that was open after the storm ended. We had many happy parents - and many disappointed kids!

Mayor Pedersen always gets phone calls of gratitude from business owners who are pleased they did not have to shut down or lose revenue due to impassable streets. Residents often stop the Mayor on the street to comment on how our roads are consistently cleared so quickly.

We know we will get snow. We know we may get some unexpected storms. Not even Tiny can totally predict Mother Nature. But even with a surprise snow storm, Franklin Park can be assured that the staff of our Water and Streets Division will put our safety first and have those plows ready for action at the first snowflake.

New Cell Phone Law Will Save Lives

In an effort to deter distracted driving, the Illinois legislature has made it illegal to use cell phones while driving without a hands-free device. Motorists could face a \$75 fine if they are caught. The new law takes effect on January 1 and also makes it illegal to talk on a cell phone while driving though a school zone or a construction zone.

The new hands-free driving law comes after Illinois lawmakers already banned texting while driving. Illinois becomes the 12th state, and the first in the Midwest, to prohibit the

use of a hand-held cell phone while driving.

Leyden Credit Union ATM Installed at the Franklin Park Police Station

A Leyden Credit Union ATM is available to the public inside the Franklin Park Police Station. The machine will accept any credit union or bank ATM / Debit Card. There is NO charge for Leyden Credit Union members who use the machine or for members of any other credit union that are part of the Co-Op Network. There is a \$2 surcharge for non-members. The ATM is available from 8 AM to 10 PM.
